

Line-Up and Match Guidelines

How to set up a line up

- a. Each official match consists of six singles matches and three doubles matches.
 - a. Teams may play additional exhibition matches if there is sufficient time and court space
- b. Coaches must exchange both singles' and doubles' line-ups simultaneously no later than 15 min. prior to the match.
- c. Coaches must rank their players according to skill level and players compete at their corresponding line. For instance, the top player must play in the top line, the second best must play line 2, the fifth best player play line 5, etc.
 - a. Violation of this rule is prohibited and called "stacking."
 - b. For this reason, we highly recommend coaches keep a log of challenge matches in order to cite evidence to justify the lineup in the event that the lineup integrity is called into question.
 - c. In singles, in the case a player is not available, all players must move up. An insufficient number of players shall default matches at the bottom of the line-up

Match format

- a. Scoring format—how many sets for singles/ doubles
 - d. Singles and doubles matches are worth one point each
 - e. Scoring rules vary between conferences
 - a. Singles matches are generally best 2/3 sets to 6 games
 - b. Doubles matches are generally pro sets to either 8 games or 10
 - c. Third sets are super tie breaks to 10 points

- b. Full Roster, Schedule, and Results MUST be entered into MaxPreps (<http://www.maxpreps.com/>)
- c. Incomplete Schedule/Results will result in teams being ineligible for dual team playoffs
